Innovation Saskatchewan is committing \$3 million through the Innovation & Science Fund (ISF) to support a major technology upgrade at the Canadian Light Source (CLS) at the University of Saskatchewan (USask), helping

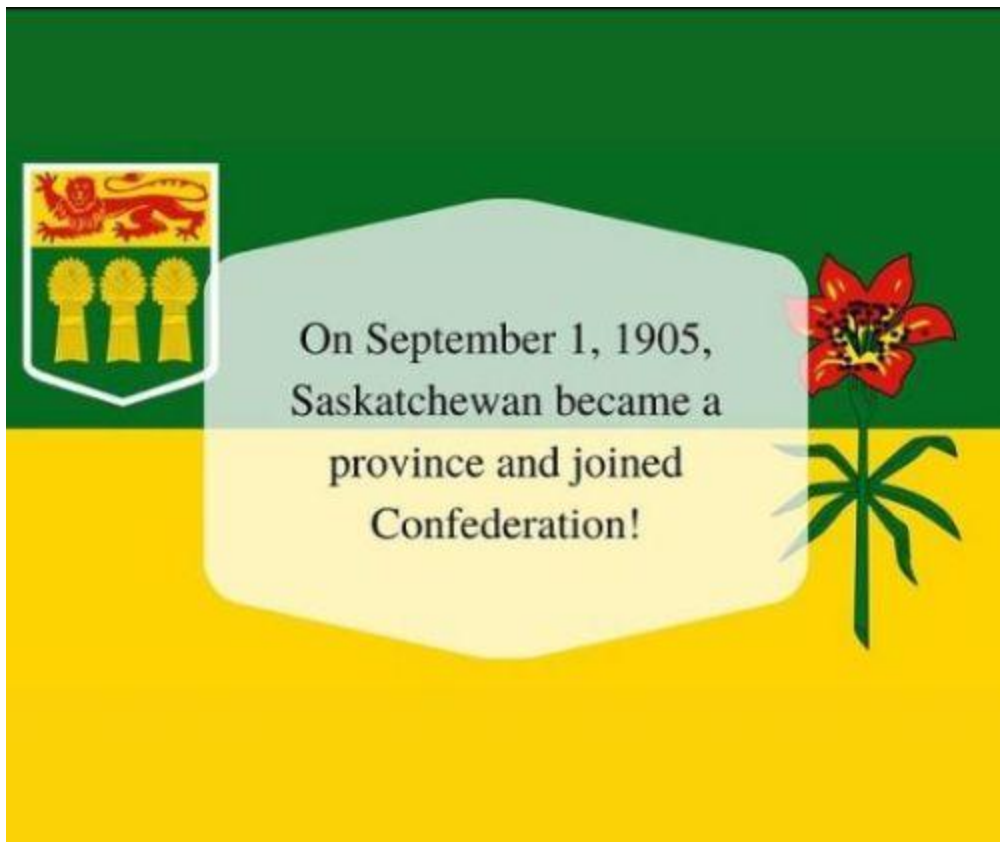
strengthen Saskatchewan's position as a global leader in research and innovation.

The funding will support the installation of a state-of-the-art solid-state amplifier (SSA), an essential component of the particle accelerator at the heart of the CLS, powering all 22 synchrotron beamlines. The upgrade will enhance the facility's performance, reliability and energy efficiency, strengthening the advanced research capabilities that researchers and industry rely on to drive innovation and discovery.

"The Canadian Light Source is one of Saskatchewan's most important research and innovation assets," Minister Responsible for Innovation Saskatchewan Warren Kaeding said. "Investing in world-class research infrastructure helps strengthen Saskatchewan's innovation ecosystem by connecting researchers, industry and institutions to accelerate discovery, commercialization and economic growth."

As the seat of government where the laws of the province are introduced, debated, and passed, the Saskatchewan Legislative Building has played a vital role in the life of the province for over 100 years.



Did you know?

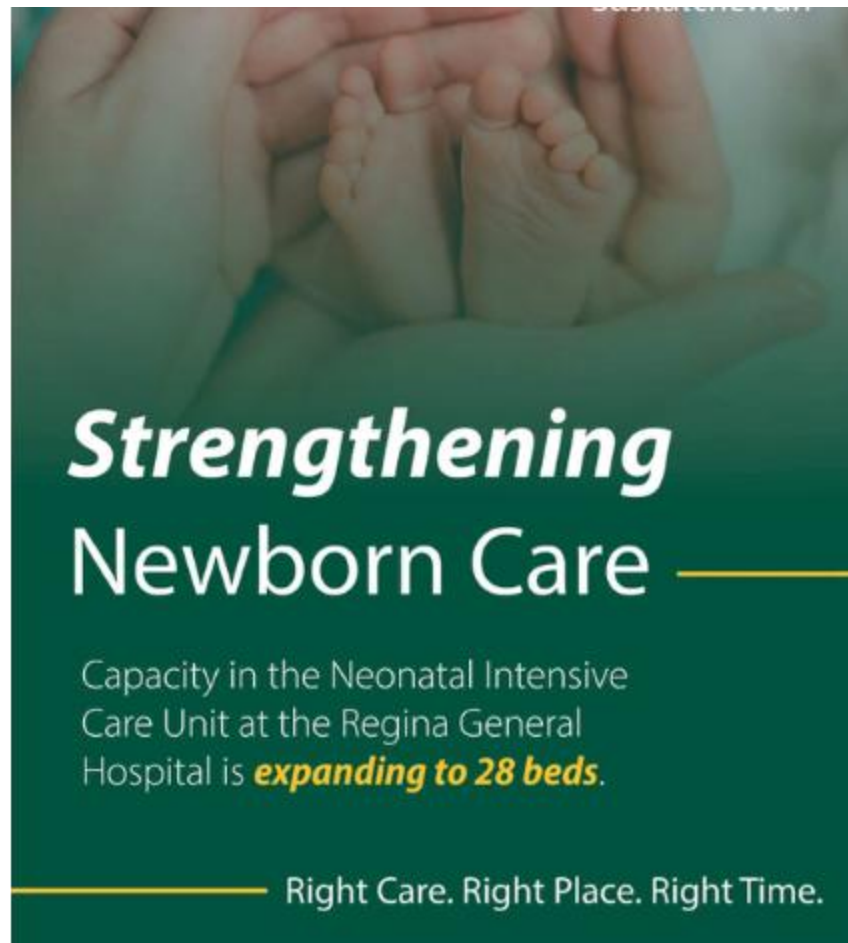
In 1978, the Legislative Building was the first building in Saskatchewan to be designated a provincial heritage property.

REGINA GENERAL HOSPITAL NEONATAL INTENSIVE CARE UNIT EXPANSION STRENGTHENS CARE FOR NEWBORNS



Capacity in the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU) at the Regina General Hospital is expanding by three beds to care for more vulnerable newborns in Regina and surrounding communities, supported by major investments from the Government of Saskatchewan and Hospitals of Regina Foundation.

The NICU is increasing from 25 to 28 beds, strengthening care for premature and medically fragile infants who require intensive monitoring and treatment.



"The new Neonatal Intensive Care Unit beds at the Regina General Hospital are an important step to putting patients first by ensuring premature and seriously ill newborns have access to high-quality and specialized care in the right place and at the right time," Health Minister Jeremy Cockrill said. "I would like to thank the Hospitals of Regina Foundation and their donors for their ongoing generosity to supporting better outcomes for patients and their families for years to come."

**SASKATCHEWAN RESPONDS TO UNITED STATES TRADE MEASURES WITH
LEVY ON AMERICAN ALCOHOL**

Statement from Premier Scott Moe on U.S. Tariffs

As of today, the United States is violating the CUSMA trade deal.

The new 50 per cent US tariffs on some Canadian goods are a clear violation of CUSMA and a clear indication that the current US administration can not be trusted to live up to its own trade deals.

Over the past few days, the Canadian government, with the support of all Premiers, was working toward a deal that would have avoided those new tariffs and reduced some of the tariffs previously imposed by the United States.

Last minute changes by US negotiators undermined the fairness and reliability of the deal.

Saskatchewan has also been clear that any attempt by the United States to influence or place conditions on Canada's trade relationships with other nations is a non-starter.

Decisions about who Canada trades with must be made by Canada.

Saskatchewan, more than any other province, is diversifying its trade to other countries, and that will not be compromised.

For those reasons, the Prime Minister made the right decision to not accept an unfair and unreliable deal, and we support the Prime Minister's decision to enact dollar for dollar counter-tariffs on targeted US products.

Let's be clear. This won't be easy.

All tariffs hurt real businesses and kill real jobs, on both sides of the border.

They drive up the cost of living for families.

That's why we should always be doing everything we can to avoid, reduce and remove tariffs.

I believe the federal government did that, but in the end, the US administration chose to stick with this failed economic policy, and Canada must respond accordingly.

Saskatchewan supports Canada's response.

In response to the 50 per cent tariff on Canadian alcohol the United States of America (USA) enacted on August 22nd, Saskatchewan will reciprocate with a 50 per cent levy on USA alcohol imported into Saskatchewan, effective September 8th.

The measure is intended to send a clear signal that Saskatchewan will continue to stand up for its industries, workers and exporters while

supporting efforts to restore fair and predictable trade between Canada and the United States (U.S.).

"Saskatchewan has always been a strong supporter of free and fair trade," Deputy Premier and Minister of Finance Jim Reiter said. "Our preference is to see tariffs removed on both sides of the border, but Saskatchewan cannot ignore measures that negatively affect our producers, exporters and communities."

SASKATOON CITY HOSPITAL ACUTE CARE, AND SASKATOON COMPLEX
NEEDS FACILITY**



"Keeping the public up to date on Saskatchewan's infrastructure investments remains an important priority for our government," SaskBuilds and Procurement Minsiter Sean Wilson said. "By sharing these stories and project updates, we are highlighting world class Saskatchewan companies like PCL and Quorex that are working on projects locally. Their expertise and hard work are helping build a strong and steady Saskatchewan for generations to come."

The August edition takes a closer look at two Saskatoon projects:

- **Saskatoon City Hospital Acute Care; and**
- **Saskatoon Complex Needs Facility.**

Saskatoon City Hospital Acute Care

The Saskatoon City Hospital Acute Care project responds to the growing demand for acute care services in Saskatoon while providing more appropriate and accessible settings for outpatient care.

The purpose of the project is to add 109 acute inpatient beds in the hospital by relocating certain outpatient programs and community care services, currently located at Saskatoon City Hospital, into the community in renovated leased space at Market Mall through a phased approach.

This consists of 60 new Acute Medicine beds, 22 new Acute Rehabilitation beds, 12 new Acquired Brain Injury beds and 15 new High Acuity beds.

"It is exciting to see major progress happening at Saskatoon City Hospital," Health Minister Jeremy Cockrill said. "With 40 medicine beds already open and another 69 acute care beds coming online, this expansion will ensure patients receive the right care, in the right place, at the right time."

Construction at Market Mall is nearly 80 per cent complete.

Work in the mall is staged by area, with various scopes complete, nearing completion or in progress. These activities include data infrastructure, interior finishes, millwork and progress made on mechanical and electrical work.

"The progress we have made to date reinforces the value of investing in spaces designed around patient needs," Saskatchewan Health Authority Integrated Saskatoon Health Deputy Chief Medical Officer Dr. Mark Fenton said. "We remain committed to advancing initiatives that enhance accessibility and connection, strengthen the patient experience and create more opportunities for healing in the appropriate environment."

"The progress of the Acute Care Expansion at Saskatoon City Hospital is an exciting milestone for our hospital and the communities we serve," Saskatoon City Hospital Foundation CEO Steve Shannon said. "As construction continues, we are seeing the vision for increased acute care become a reality. In addition to the 109 new beds, the project is creating the capacity, equipment and resources needed to provide patients with access to the care they need closer to home. With the support of our donors, we are proud to see this important investment taking shape and the positive impact it will have on patients, families, and health care teams across Saskatchewan."

Construction commenced in November 2025 and completion is anticipated in early 2027.

The project is in response to one of the Government of Saskatchewan's (GOS) commitments to enhance emergency, critical and acute care services in the province.

Saskatoon Complex Needs Facility

Operations continue at the Saskatoon Complex Needs Facility as the structure undergoes interior and exterior renovations.

The project has reached approximately 80 per cent construction completion. Completed work to date includes new client washrooms, accessibility upgrades, installation of a sprinkler system and landscaping improvements.

"Strengthening public safety requires compassionate and effective responses for people experiencing a crisis," Community Safety Minister Michael Weger said. "The success we are seeing from the facilities in Regina and Saskatoon shows that connecting individuals to appropriate care not only supports better outcomes for those in need, but also helps police focus on their core responsibilities and contributes to safer Saskatchewan communities."

In October 2023, GOS announced funding for 30 new spaces between two facilities in Regina and Saskatoon to enhance community safety by providing a safe and secure place for individuals struggling with addictions to stabilize under medical supervision. Saskatoon City Council granted approval to allow the Saskatoon Complex Needs Facility to operate permanently in this location, subject to additional renovations required to meet building code.

Complex needs facilities provide an alternative to holding intoxicated individuals in police cells with limited medical assistance or in a hospital emergency department.

The facility is located at the former Saskatchewan Liquor and Gaming Authority building at 1701 Idylwyld Drive North.

"Quorex Construction appreciates the opportunity to have worked with the Ministry of SaskBuilds and Procurement to provide Tenant Improvements at

the Saskatoon Complex Needs Facility that we hope improves the facility to better provide services and support to members within our community."

Project planning started in March 2025 followed by the design phase in September 2025. Construction began in February 2026 and remains active with completion anticipated in fall 2026.

Did you know:

- **A single leased space was obtained to maintain both Geriatric Evaluation and Management and Pre-Admission Clinic outpatient services in one location. Based in Market Mall, the new space benefits from proximity to a range of established health care providers, creating a natural opportunity for individuals to access additional health care services.**
- **Renovations at the Saskatoon Complex Needs Facility continue while the facility remains operational, creating unique challenges and requiring coordination between the Ministry of SaskBuilds and Procurement, the contractor and facility staff.**

The 2026-27 Provincial Budget delivers a capital budget in Saskatchewan of \$4.3 billion, one of the largest total capital budgets in Saskatchewan's history.

MITACS AND FIRST NATIONS UNIVERSITY OF CANADA PARTNERSHIP

YOUR LEGISLATIVE REPORT



A new school year is always a meaningful time for Saskatchewan families. Classrooms are once again filled with students setting new goals, teachers preparing for another year of learning and school communities coming together. It is also a reminder that the investments we make in education today help shape the opportunities available to young people in the years ahead.

One of those priorities is ensuring students develop strong literacy skills early in their education. Reading proficiency by the end of Grade 3 is one of the strongest predictors of future academic success and high school graduation, which is why Saskatchewan continues to focus on improving literacy outcomes. We also continue to expand the Specialized Support model to 50 additional schools this year, bringing the total to 108 schools across all 27 school divisions. With additional resources and specially

trained staff, the model helps students build self-regulation skills and supports positive learning experiences.

The opportunities available to students do not end when they leave the K-12 system. This fall, Saskatchewan is reaching an important milestone in health professional training with the first students beginning *the new Master of Occupational Therapy and Master of Speech-Language Pathology programs* at the University of Saskatchewan. A \$37 million provincial investment has made it possible to bring this training to Saskatchewan. With 80 students forming the first cohorts, these programs will significantly increase the number of people who can train for professions that are essential to our health care system. Preparing more health professionals means more opportunities for students to build their careers here at home, and more professionals available to soon serve patients and families across Saskatchewan communities.

Creating those opportunities is especially important as Saskatchewan continues to attract people who want to live, work and raise their families here. That growth is reflected in our housing numbers. In 2025, Saskatchewan recorded 6,150 new housing starts, the highest level since 2014 and a 42 per cent increase from the previous year – the strongest growth among the provinces. The latest figures show that momentum continuing, with 3,083 housing starts recorded between January and June 2026. With housing remaining the largest single expense for many families, our government continues to invest more than \$60 million each year in programs that increase housing supply and support affordability.

A growing province must also have the health care capacity to meet the needs of its residents. In Regina, families will benefit from the expansion of the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit at Regina General Hospital, which is increasing from 25 to 28 beds. The additional capacity will provide specialized care for more premature and medically fragile newborns in Regina and surrounding communities. Making those beds available also means making sure there are people to provide the care. The expansion is supported by an \$8.32 million investment in pediatric and neonatal care through the *2026-27 Provincial Budget*, including more than \$2 million for

staffing associated with the new beds. More than 17 full-time equivalent positions will help ensure the unit can operate safely and sustainably as demand for neonatal care continues to grow. Our government recognizes the Hospitals of Regina Foundation and its donors for their ongoing generosity and commitment to better outcomes for Saskatchewan families.

The same focus on strengthening health care extends beyond our larger centres. Effective September 1, *Saskatchewan's Rural and Remote Recruitment Incentive program* expanded to 12 additional communities, bringing participation to 94 communities across the province. Eligible communities can offer incentives of up to \$50,000 for a three-year return-of-service commitment in designated high-priority occupations. These incentives are an important tool for attracting and retaining health professionals where they are needed most and ensuring people in rural and remote communities can access the right care, in the right place and at the right time.

Supporting people in our communities goes beyond health care. Our government is providing \$1.3 million through this year's provincial budget to 15 community-based organizations serving individuals with intellectual disabilities. The funding will support accessibility improvements, kitchen and bathroom renovations, exterior upgrades and other work at group homes, respite homes and day programs. These are practical investments that help create welcoming spaces where people can develop skills, build relationships and participate more fully in their communities.

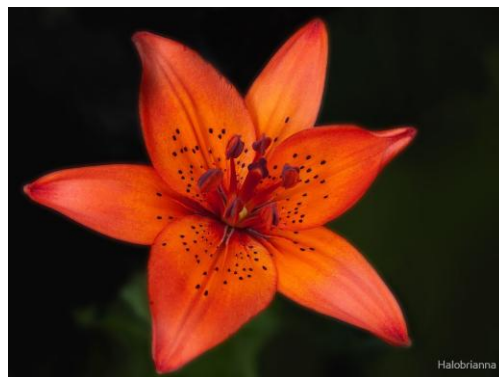

**DID YOU KNOW?
FUN FACTS!**

Flag: Saskatchewan's official flag was adopted in 1969. It features the provincial shield of arms along with the floral emblem, the western red lily. The flag's upper half is green, representing Saskatchewan's northern forests; the lower half is gold, symbolizing the southern grain areas.



Flower: In 1941, the western red lily was chosen as the official flower of Saskatchewan. This lily grows in moist meadows and semi-wooded areas. With its flaming red blossoms, it stands out brilliantly against a natural green background. The western red lily is a protected species.



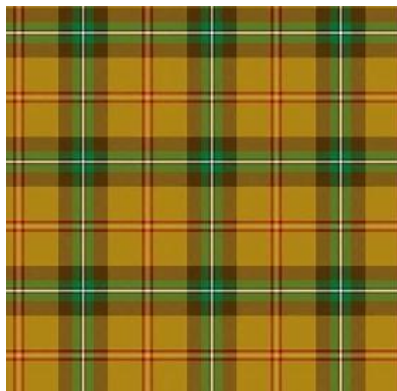
Bird: The sharp-tailed grouse is one of Saskatchewan's most popular game birds. It was selected as the provincial bird emblem in 1945.



Grass: In 2001, needle-and-thread grass was designated Saskatchewan's official grass. It's a native bunchgrass common to the dry, sandy soils of the Northern Plains. Seed stalks may reach 1.3 m (4 feet) in height and leaves are up to 30 cm (12 inches) long and very narrow. The name comes from the shape of the seeds, which are sharply pointed and have long, twisted, thread-like fibres.



Saskatchewan District Tartan: The Saskatchewan Provincial District Tartan has seven colours: gold, brown, green, red, yellow, white and black. It was registered with the Court of Lord Lyon King of Arms in Scotland in 1961.



Saskatchewan Dress Tartan: The Saskatchewan Dress Tartan was introduced in 1997 for competitive highland dancers on the occasion of the Canadian Interprovincial Highland Dancing Championships held that year in Regina. It is a variant of the Saskatchewan District Tartan, with the off-white line of the original tartan becoming the background colour of the dress version.



Tree: In 1988, the white birch was adopted as the official tree of Saskatchewan. This hardwood tree is found across the northern three-quarters of the province. Typical uses for the wood include lumber, plywood, veneer and fuel.



Emblem: Multis E Gentibus Vires, "From Many Peoples Strength" - The provincial Coat of Arms was granted through Royal Warrant from Queen Elizabeth II in 1986. It is an augmentation of the original shield of arms adopted by Royal Warrant of King Edward VII in 1906. A crest of a beaver and crown is placed above the shield. On either side of the shield are supporters: a lion and a deer. The shield itself displays the royal lion and three gold wheat sheaves, symbolizing Saskatchewan agriculture. The base is formed of western red lilies, Saskatchewan's floral emblem.



Mineral: Sylvite, also known as potash, is Saskatchewan's official mineral. We are the world's largest producer and exporter of potash. Our vast reserves of potash are expected to last for hundreds of years at current rates of production. Over 95 percent of the potash produced in Saskatchewan is used for fertilizer purposes.



Animal: Saskatchewan designated the white-tailed deer our official animal in 2001. Here in our more northern latitudes, the white-tailed deer tends to be larger than its southern brethren, reaching heights of more than a metre (3.5 feet) at the shoulder and weighing as much as 180 kg (400 lbs). Adults have a reddish-brown summer coat and a greyish-brown winter coat, with white underparts. The name comes from the white underside of the tail, which is raised like a flag when the deer is running or frightened.



Fish: Saskatchewan's official fish is the walleye (*Sander vitreus*). Saskatchewan is known for its world-class fresh water fishing and during the province's centennial in 2005, Saskatchewan Environment held a Provincial Fish Emblem Contest. Ten thousand people voted and the walleye was the overwhelming choice. On January 4, 2005, a walleye measuring 36.5" in length, 22.5" in girth and 18.3 pounds was caught in the frozen waters of Tobin Lake. In 2014, a 13.3lb Walleye was caught spearfishing on the South Saskatchewan River north of Lake Diefenbaker, which has been recognized by the International Underwater Spearfishing Association as a record.



Sport: Curling was named Saskatchewan's official sport in 2001, although many have considered it so for years. Once called the "roaring game" because of the thunderous noise made by corn brooms used to sweep rocks down the ice, curling has a rich history in the province. The fabled Richardson brothers, curling out of Regina, won four Canadian and World men's championships between 1959-63. Another extraordinary rink from Regina, the Sandra Schmirler team, won three Canadian and World women's championships in the '90s, followed by the first ever women's Olympic gold medal in curling at 1998.

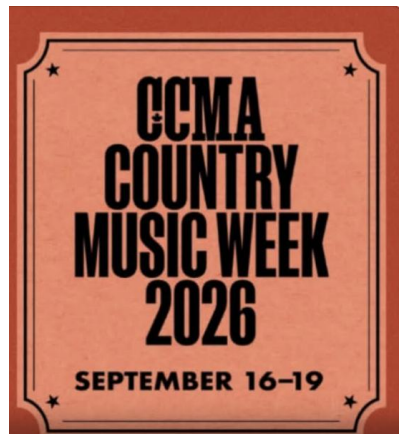

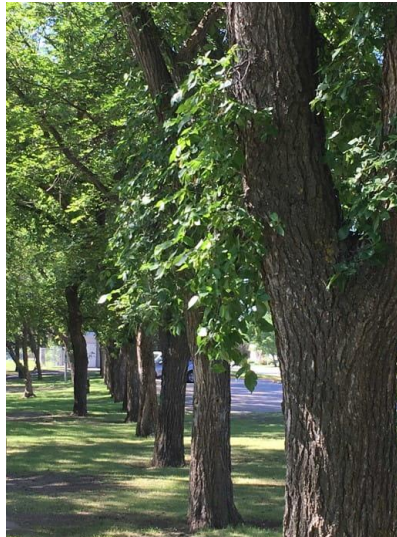

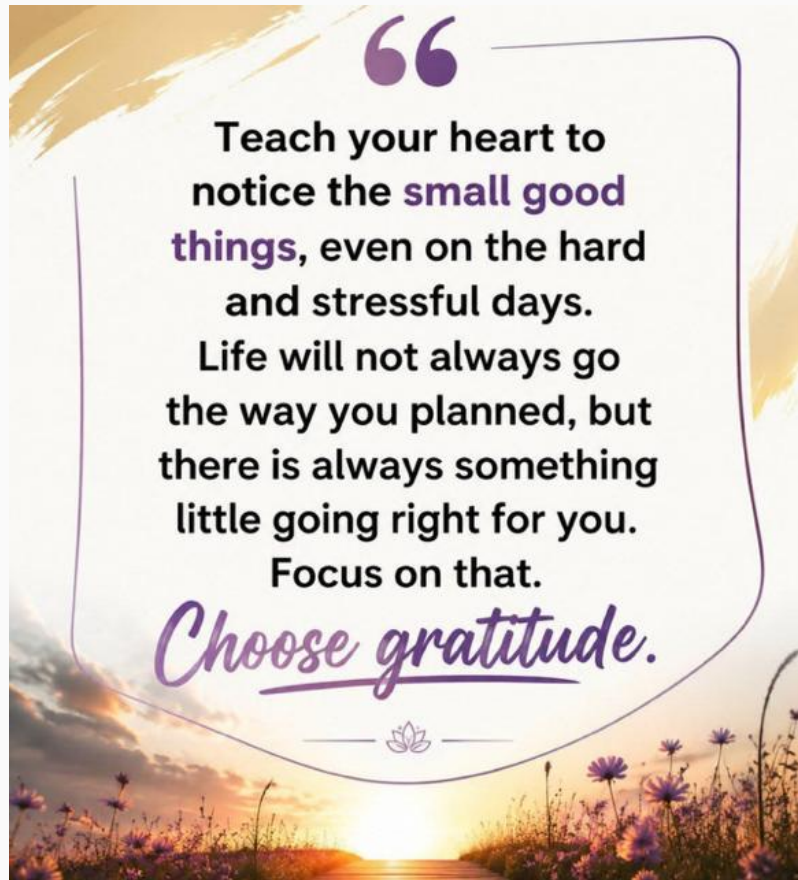
