FALL LEGISLATIVE SESSION DELIVERS ON COMMITMENTS TO STAND UP FOR SASKATCHEWAN



Fall Session Takeaway:
Stood Up for Saskatchewan

Premier Scott Moe said the government ended the fall sitting of the legislative session by delivering on priorities for the economy and people of Saskatchewan.

“During this fall session, we outlined our commitment to balance the budget in the spring, continued the fight against the federal carbon tax and invested in the services and infrastructure necessary for the people of this province,” Moe said. “Over the past seven weeks, our government became a leader in the country through legislation to expand Workers’ Compensation coverage for firefighters, create the longest maternity leave in the nation and become the first province in Canada to introduce Clare’s Law to help those at risk of intimate

partner violence.”

As the threat of a federal carbon tax continues to face Saskatchewan, the Government of Saskatchewan is implementing Prairie Resilience, the made-in-Saskatchewan climate change plan supported by industry. This includes legislation introduced this fall to establish intensity-based performance standards for large emitters as well as the new Climate Resilience Measurement Framework, the first of its kind in Canada, with 25 different measures to monitor and enhance Saskatchewan’s resilience to climate change.

“Even as our province continues to face trade, transportation and economic challenges, this session we saw a year-over-year employment increase of 9,400 jobs – the largest job gains since 2014,” Moe said. “We will continue to stand up for our province locally, national and internationally to continue this job growth and fight the Trudeau carbon tax, which will kill jobs and make our industries less competitive.”

Safety was also a focus of the fall session with the introduction of mandatory minimum training requirements of 121.5 hours for commercial semi drivers, a proposed enhancement to rural policing to allow municipalities with populations under 500 to join regional police services and amendments to trespassing legislation which will afford rural land owners the same requirements for land access as urban land owners.

To help Saskatchewan people who may need time off from work to care for family members, changes to The Saskatchewan Employment Act will create a new critically ill adult leave, expand parental leave and add an additional week of maternity leave. More people who face health challenges because of their jobs will be covered through changes to The Workers’ Compensation Act, making Saskatchewan a leader in the country for the number of occupational diseases firefighters will have presumptive coverage for.

Saskatchewan announced plans to be the first province in Canada with Clare’s Law, legislation to provide police services with a framework to disclose information about someone’s violent past to intimate partners who may be at risk. Interpersonal violence leave will also be expanded to include sexual violence of any kind, allowing Saskatchewan residents to take time off to seek medical attention or access supports.

This session, the government announced a commitment to apologize to those in our province affected by the Sixties Scoop. Sharing Circles, led by the Sixties Scoop Indigenous Society of Saskatchewan, took place across the province to help inform the apology.

Infrastructure investments continued with Saskatchewan Hospital North Battleford nearing

completion, the Jim Pattison Children's Hospital reaching 92 per cent completion, working on rural cellular service with another 50 communities to see better coverage by the spring and the opening of new bridges, passing lanes and intersection improvements across the province.

Bilateral agreements were signed with the federal government this fall to provide nearly \$900 million for infrastructure projects over the next decade and more than \$5 million to improve access to treatment for people with opioid or crystal meth dependencies.

The next sitting of the Legislative Assembly is scheduled to begin March 4, 2019.

PROVINCE AND NUTRIEN RENEW COMMITMENT TO STARS AND NEW HELICOPTER FLEET

The Government of Saskatchewan is committing to renew its 10-year agreement with Shock Trauma Air Rescue Service (STARS) beyond 2020 to provide helicopter air medical service in Saskatchewan. The province will also fund one of the three new helicopters needed in Saskatchewan as part of the organization's plan for fleet renewal.

"We are pleased to announce our government's renewed agreement with STARS," Rural and Remote Health Minister Greg Ottenbreit said. "This agreement demonstrates our commitment to timely access to emergency medical services for the residents of Saskatchewan, particularly those in rural and remote areas. Thank you to STARS for their continued service to the people of Saskatchewan, and to Nutrien for their ongoing support."

Nutrien announced its renewed support for STARS in Saskatchewan, committing funding toward the purchase of a new H145 helicopter. The first H145 will arrive in Saskatchewan in 2019, with the others being phased in under STARS' renewal plan by 2023.

The financial support from Nutrien has been instrumental in ensuring the success of the STARS air medical service in the province. In addition to providing a helicopter, Nutrien also provides the hangar used as STARS' Saskatoon base.

"Nutrien is proud to renew its long-term support of STARS and ensure this vital service can be enhanced for the people of Saskatchewan," Nutrien Vice-President of Sustainability and Stakeholder Relations Candace Laing said. "We have operations that span the province and we know the importance of having access to emergency care for our communities."

SASKATCHEWAN HAS SHORTEST WAIT TIMES, SAYS SURVEY



Saskatchewan patients have the shortest total wait times in the country to see a specialist, according to the Fraser Institute's annual survey of Canadian specialists.

The median wait time for Saskatchewan patients receiving specialist services was estimated at 15.4 weeks. The longest median waits were in New Brunswick estimated at 45.1 weeks. Saskatchewan was one of only two provinces that did not show an increase in the number of procedures that patients are waiting for.

"Since 2007, our government has recruited 487 new specialists an increase of 62 per cent," Health Minister Jim Reiter said. "We are pleased that the survey indicates patients are getting to see specialists sooner, but we recognize there is still more work to do."

MORE OPTIONS FOR A SAFE RIDE HOME: RIDESHARING REGULATIONS APPROVED



Government has approved regulations that will open the door for rideshare companies to begin operating in the province, as long as they follow requirements set out by the municipality in which they operate. Regulations will take effect on December 14, 2018.

“After extensive consultation with numerous stakeholders – including rideshare and taxi companies, municipalities and law enforcement – SGI has developed a provincial framework that strikes a good balance between public demand and safety,” Minister Responsible for SGI Joe Hargrave said. “Ridesharing will provide Saskatchewan residents more ways to get around in the province, and another option for planning a safe ride home.”

“Saskatchewan has some of the strongest impaired driving legislation in the country, but in addition to having effective legislation and strong penalties, it is crucial to ensure the availability of safe, convenient and reliable transportation options,” MADD Canada Regional Manager Michelle Okere said. “By establishing provincial rules to enable ridesharing, the Government of Saskatchewan is providing a framework for an industry that will provide more safe rides and be an effective partner in the effort to end impaired driving.”

SASKATCHEWAN ANNOUNCES WATERFLOOD DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM TO SUPPORT PETROLEUM INDUSTRY

The Government of Saskatchewan announced a program today designed to improve the petroleum industry’s long-term operating environment, sustain jobs, and increase investment activity in our province.

The Waterflood Development Program will incentivize the conversion of producing wells into waterflood injection wells or the drilling of new dedicated waterflood injection wells. At maximum uptake, the program will support \$375 million in new investment over the next five years and 500 new permanent jobs. Over 10 years, the program will lead to an estimated \$245 million in new provincial royalties. The program will also enhance the competitiveness of Saskatchewan's energy industry by facilitating an economically sustainable increase of production capacity by an estimated 72 million barrels over the course of the next 35 years.

"Waterflooding is a proven enhanced oil recovery strategy that is good for sustainability and good for the environment," Energy and Resources Minister Bronwyn Eyre said. "In the face of a rapidly changing global market, Saskatchewan is addressing competitiveness by supporting our province's largest economic sector with a cost-effective policy that encourages long-term capital investment."

WCB COVERAGE EXPANDED FOR SASKATCHEWAN FIREFIGHTERS

Saskatchewan firefighters were in the legislature today when an amendment to include six new cancers for presumptive coverage under *The Workers' Compensation Act, 2013* was announced.

Fire fighters will be able to file a Workers' Compensation Board (WCB) claim for prostate, skin, breast, cervical and ovarian cancer, as well as multiple myeloma under the occupational disease presumption. This addition makes Saskatchewan a leader in Canada for the number of occupational diseases firefighters have presumptive coverage for.

"Firefighters are running toward danger as others run away, and face great risks when performing

their duties in often challenging situations,” Labour Relations and Workplace Safety Minister Don Morgan said. “They also face the potential of dealing with occupational diseases related to their chosen profession.”

NEW MENTAL HEALTH TRAINING PROGRAM FOR PHYSICIANS LAUNCHED IN SASKATOON

A new training program that will better equip physicians to assess and treat mental health conditions in children and youth is launched last week in Saskatoon.

The REACH Institute's Patient-Centered Mental Health in Pediatric Primary Care program is being presented by the Continuing Medical Education (CME) Division at the University of Saskatchewan, with \$400,000 of funding from the Government of Saskatchewan.

"Mental health is a priority for our government," Health Minister Jim Reiter said. "This training program will better equip doctors to meet the mental health care needs of children and youth."

During the three-day training session, 25 physicians from across Saskatchewan will participate in 16 hours of interactive course work to build their skills in diagnosing and treating mental health conditions in children and youth. Following this, participants will take part in a six-month case-based distance learning program to continue to advance their knowledge and skills in this area.

HIGHEST RATE OF JOB GROWTH IN WESTERN CANADA



Saskatchewan's year-over-year employment increased by 16,300 jobs in November according to Statistics Canada's Labour Force Survey released today. This is the largest job increase since 2013 and marks the fourth consecutive month of strong job gains for the province.

Saskatchewan had the highest rate of year-over-year job growth in Western Canada at 2.9 per cent, ranking second nationally, behind Prince Edward Island.

Full-time employment increased by 10,200 jobs and part-time increased by 6,100 jobs since this time last year. On a monthly basis, seasonally adjusted employment increased by 5,500 jobs from October 2018.

"The fourth consecutive month of year-over-year job increases shows a positive trend for our economy," Immigration and Career Training Minister Jeremy Harrison said. "In spite of headwinds that our economy faces from outside of our borders, job creators are choosing Saskatchewan as the best province in Western Canada to invest and create jobs in. Our government will continue to stand up for our province's economy and resource sector to ensure further growth in order for Saskatchewan to remain the best place in the nation to invest, work, play and to raise a family."

NEARLY 150 MORE LICENSED CHILD CARE CENTRE SPACES ALLOCATED



Crown Investments Corporation Minister Joe Hargrave on behalf of Deputy Premier and Education Minister Gordon Wyant, joined students and staff at St. Catherine Catholic School and Children's Choice Child Development Co-operative in Prince Albert to announce that nearly 150 additional child care centre spaces have been allocated in Prince Albert, Regina, Saskatoon and Swift Current.

Children's Choice will be receiving 54 of these spaces. Funding is being provided through the Canada-Saskatchewan Early Learning and Child Care (ELCC) Agreement.

"We are very excited to be able to allocate more licensed child care centre spaces," Hargrave said. "Today's announcement brings our total allocation to nearly 1,200 new spaces across the province this year. Access to affordable, high-quality child care is important to families across Saskatchewan and we are very pleased to make child care accessible for more families in Prince Albert."

SASKATCHEWAN MARKS NATIONAL DAY OF REMEMBRANCE AND ACTION ON VIOLENCE WOMEN

"It is crucial that we as a province work together to prevent violence against women and girls in our communities."

Today in the Legislature, MLAs will wear a white ribbon to show their support to end and prevent violence against girls and women. The white ribbon campaign was launched in 1991 to raise awareness about and condemn gender-based violence, and to promote gender equality.
