I hope teachers, students and support staff had a great first week of the new school year!

Whether summer was jam-packed with activities or filled with complaints about being bored with nothing to do, kids often have a tough time making the back-to-school transition. I read an interesting article and wanted to share some important information with you:

As with any new or potentially unsettling situation — like starting school for the first time
or entering a new grade or new school — allow kids time to adjust. Remind them that
everyone feels a little nervous about the first day of school and that it will all become an
everyday routine in no time.

- It's important to talk to kids about what worries them and offer reassurance: Are they
 afraid they won't make new friends or get along with their teachers? Is the thought of
 schoolwork stressing them out? Are they worried about the bully from last year?
- We all have a critical role to play in building and promoting respectful and kind behaviour
 in our schools and communities Acts of bullying, harassment, intimidation and violence
 have a profound effect on an individual's feeling of safety and self-worth. I encourage
 everyone to work together to prevent bullying in our schools, communities and online.
- To help ease back-to-school butterflies, try to transition kids into a consistent schoolnight routine a few weeks before school starts. Also make sure that they:
 - get enough sleep (establish a reasonable bedtime so that they'll be well-rested and ready to learn in the morning)
 - eat a healthy breakfast (they're more alert and do better in school if they eat a

good

breakfast every day)

- use a wall calendar or personal planner to record when assignments are due, tests will be given, extracurricular practices and rehearsals will be held, etc.
- have them organize and set out what they need the night before (homework and books should be put in their backpacks by the door and clothes should be laid out in their bedrooms)

JUNE WAGES IN SASKATCHEWAN INCREASE YEAR OVER YEAR

The average Saskatchewan worker's weekly wages were \$980.11 in June 2014, an increase of 3.6 per cent compared to last June. Saskatchewan wages were the third highest among all the provinces.

"Strong economic conditions are helping drive wages higher," Minister responsible for Immigration, Jobs, Skills and Training Jeremy Harrison said. "This is another positive when it comes to recruiting and retaining skilled labour to the province."


On a monthly basis, wages in the province were up 1.9 per cent over last month, more than triple the national increase of 0.6 per cent.

Saskatchewan had the highest increase among the provinces.

"When you factor in inflation, wages in the province were 1.4 per cent higher in June on an annual basis, which means people are seeing real gains in take-home pay," Harrison said. "Today's report is good news. It demonstrates that Saskatchewan continues to lead the nation in terms of employment and opportunities."

NEW WEST PARTNERSHIP COMMITS TO REDUCE EXCEPTIONS

Premiers Brad Wall, Dave Hancock and Christy Clark agreed to review the list of exceptions to the New West Partnership Trade Agreement (NWPTA) to make trade in the New West even more open.

Currently, the NWPTA provides the most open trading environment in Canada. Premiers are asking Ministers responsible to implement further improvements.

Specifically, Ministers are to:

- · implement a bid protest mechanism by November 2014; and
- review exceptions to determine if there are other possible improvements to liberalize trade, particularly in the area of occupational health and safety by March 31, 2015.

"While exceptions can be important in areas like occupational health and safety, it makes sense to review these from time to time to harmonize those that create unnecessary barriers to trade," said Premier Christy Clark. "For example, if we can all adopt the highest standard among our jurisdictions for things like first aid kits that will make trade across the region easier."


The New West Partnership has undertaken significant work to make it easier for businesses to operate across the region by harmonizing trucking rules and regulations, creating a single window for business registration, and ensuring consistent rules across the three provinces.

"In today's businesses environment companies and workers often cross provincial borders,"

Premier Brad Wall said. "We all have a strong interest in ensuring worker health and safety and it makes sense to have a common set of rules for businesses and workers to uphold these safety objectives."

STUDENTS CAN RECEIVE HIGH SCHOOL AND MILITARY DUAL CREDIT

Thanks to an agreement between the Government of Saskatchewan, the 38 Canadian Brigade Group, Regina Public Schools and the Regina Catholic School Division, high school students in the Regina area now have the opportunity to receive military dual credit recognition through the Canadian Armed Forced Primary Reserve Co-op Program.

This addresses one of the goals in the Saskatchewan Plan for Growth that by 2015 there will be an expansion of alternative credentials for high school completion through partnerships with school boards, teachers, training institutions, business and industry.

"Our government has deep respect for our Canadian Armed Forces and their commitment and dedication to serving our country and our youth," Education Minister Don Morgan said. "The Primary Reserve Co-op Program will help students learn valuable life and leadership skills and I encourage other school divisions to explore similar dual credit opportunities."
